In the evenings, when we had our evening prayers, then of course, you know, the lamplight and all that, you know, we didn't have electricity like this. Then they would sit at the table and smoke their pipe. My grandma had her own pipe, grandpa had his. And they would have evening prayer first, and then they would socialize just by smoking, talking about things for the day. And then my grandmother would tell me, okay, you know, now it's time for your bedtime. And I would sleep with her.

So she would put me to bed and then she'd start telling me stories that, I mean, your imagination can just run wild when you hear it in your language, you know, it's just like watching TV, the cartoons, it just grabs your attention. Well, it's the same thing, but it was in my mind. And because of the way that she would talk and her expressions, you know, her tone of voice or all of that, it makes the story come alive, so to speak. And so I would just be so mesmerized just listening to her talk about these stories that she told me.

And usually, just at the end, you know, you're just all tense and waiting for something bad to happen. And so, and then translating it, she'd say, and that's why I want you to be good. She said, don't be like this one in the story.
