I've seen people driving down the road pulling a horse trailer with six horses in it...and then you see the people walking down the road with their backpack. And we're all native. We have to adjust to whatever our situation is in this contemporary lifestyle. I think deep inside, we can incorporate what our sense of self is...what we believe in...what our values are...every day...we don't just have to wait for powwow time, for example, to do that. We should do that every day. It should be a part of our lives.
