And you look at that story of Pocahontas, that guy, he's that, it shows that, you know, that these guns were to fight the Indians. We never had gun control before, before the... And there wasn't a way to, you can always duck out of an arrow, away from an arrow, you know. It kind of makes me laugh because when they talk about Sandy Hook, and the president was crying over Sandy Hook, why don't they cry over Wounded Knee?

We felt that pain first, where they killed everybody, and they weren't even fighting, you know. They don't think about things like that.
